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Richard Rohr's Daily Meditation

February 18, 2021

From the Center for Action and Contemplation



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The Reciprocity of the Universe

The bloodline of God is connected to everything . . . shells on the ocean shore, the mushrooms growing in the forest, the trees stretching to the clouds, the tiniest speck of snow in the winter, and our dust-to-dustness—we are all connected and tethered to this sacred gift of creation. —Kaitlin B. Curtice, Native: Identity, Belonging, and Rediscovering God

In cultures that have kept alive the knowledge that we are all one, woven in the same fabric of life (what I referred to earlier this week as "the Great Chain of Being"), people honor the reciprocity of the universe through ritual and tradition. Botanist and member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation Robin Wall Kimmerer elaborates on this teaching:

The ceremonial giveaway is an echo of our oldest teachings.

Generosity is simultaneously a moral and a material imperative, especially among people who live close to the land and know its waves of plenty and scarcity. Where the well-being of one is linked to the well-being of all. Wealth among traditional people is measured by having enough to give away. Hoarding the gift, we become constipated with wealth, bloated with possessions, too heavy to join the dance....

I don't know the origin of the giveaway, but I think that we learned it from watching the plants, especially the berries who offer up their gifts all wrapped in red and blue. We may forget the teacher, but our language remembers: our word for the giveaway, *minidewak*, means "they give from the heart." At the word's center lives the word *min. Min* is a root word for *gift*, but it is also the word for *berry*. In the poetry of our language, might speaking of *minidewak* remind us to be as the berries?

The berries are always present at our ceremonies. They join us in a wooden bowl. One big bowl and one big spoon, which are passed around the circle, so that each person can taste the sweetness, remember the gifts, and say thank you. . . . The generosity of the earth is not an invitation to take it all. Every bowl has a bottom. When it's empty, it's empty. . . .

How do we refill the empty bowl? Is gratitude alone enough? Berries teach us otherwise. . . . The berries trust that we will uphold our end of the bargain and disperse their seeds to new places to grow. . . . They remind us that all flourishing is mutual. We need the berries and the berries need us. Their gifts multiply by our care for them, and dwindle from our neglect. We are bound in a covenant of reciprocity, a pact of mutual responsibility to sustain those who sustain us. And so the empty bowl is filled. . . .

The moral covenant of reciprocity calls us to honor our responsibilities for all we have been given, for all that we have taken. It's our turn now, long overdue. . . . Whatever our gift, we are called to give it and to dance for the renewal of the world.

Dear Church Friends and Family,

"We want to send a clear and strong message to congregations who are considering going back to meeting in person: We urge you to wait until ALL safety concerns have been addressed." United Church of Christ leadership

Many of us, including Council Members, are anxious to resume

Worship Services in person. We want to assure you that re-opening the church for in-person worship is a topic of discussion at each of our Council meetings. Among the issues we are examining are:

1) Making sure that whatever we decide, re-opening is consistent with our commitment to inclusion, so that anyone who wants to attend can attend safely.

2) Considering how and whether we would be able modify our church infrastructure to extract air out of the church. Currently, we do not have that capability.

3) Investing in the cost of special filters for every air duct. This not only involves the expense of the filters (considerable), but would also require that the blower fan on our new furnace run almost constantly.

4) Investing in the cost of cleaning the church after every use, which would involve investing in a "fogger" device that uses a sanitizing chemical for our surfaces.

5) Social distancing, which we feel would be pretty easy to accomplish in our church with our current membership.

6) Universal masking for everyone in the church.

7) Analyzing state and county data and complying with all other state mandates for gatherings and CDC recommendations

All Council members are aware of the impact the pandemic has had on our society and on our congregation, specifically. As a social worker, I do not use the word "trauma" lightly; yet, there is no doubt that many of us have individually and collectively been traumatized by the impact of this disease. We may also find the new variants frightening, albeit in a different way, and this invites stress that isn't related to a specific external threat, but still is perceived and interpreted by our body's normal mechanical processes¹. In "normal" times, we would usually turn to our church and our relationships with others in the church to find comfort and alleviate these stresses. This has not been possible over the past year, and we recognize that this has become stressful in and of itself.

On the positive side, the number of new infections has begun to decline in the new year. Vaccinations are occurring at an increasingly rapid pace, and it will not be long before the temperatures will invite us outdoors once again to recreate and meet in small groups. In addition, people of our congregation tell us they have been adhering to the state mandates and when they have met with others, they have engaged in social distancing and have been masked.

Our ability to purchase and use new technology for delivering live-streamed services has been a blessing during this tumultuous period. Still, we recognize that this "holy experiment" is no long-term substitute for gathering and worshipping in person, and we recognize that we are charged with the responsibility

of meeting our human needs while attending to diversity and accessibility. We must also take the church's role of community leader seriously, and trust in the resilience of the church.

We have taken a two-step approach to gathering and tracking data in our state and county. Though "herd immunity" will not likely be fully reached until vaccination rates exceed 75%, we feel that we can combine vaccination rate data with data on COVID cases per 100,000 population and the rates of positive tests to determine when we should reopen. Here are the guidelines we have been following, as recommended by the UCC:

Here is the data we currently have for Otsego County:

Vaccination rates:

Otsego County (pop. 16 and older=20,008): 17.4% (1st dose: 4,325; 2nd dose 2,069).

Daily Cases (per 100,000):

Otsego County: 30.1

Infection (Transmission) Rates:

Otsego County: 1.09

Positive Test Rates:

Otsego County: 3.3%

You can see from this data that we are almost at the "safest" level! When our vaccination rates increase from the current rate of 17.4% to the 75% rate, we can fall into the "safest" range. Having said that, Council will continue discussing what makes sense for *our* congregation. As soon as any decisions have been made to alter our previous guidelines, we will be sure to inform you. Our next Council meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, March 10, by zoom. The link to that meeting can be found here:

Readings each week will include 2-4 bible verses and 2-4 pages in book!





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<u>Report from Your Trustees – March 2021 Newsletter</u>

- As we begin a new year still abiding by pandemic restrictions, we continue to ask everyone to mail your contributions to our church office at 218 W. Second St. If you prefer the convenience of online donations, you can also contribute using the PayPal button on our website at www.firstuccgaylord.org .
- Our church budget for the current year approved at our annual meeting last fall calls for an average weekly income of \$1,775 from tithes and offerings. Through February 14th, our actual average weekly income was \$1,752. Thank you to all of our generous donors!
- During Calendar Year 2020, our church contributed \$2,700 to local and UCC special ministries! These contributions are a result of "special collections" which we sponsor on various Sundays as coordinated by our Reaching Out team. Mission recipients include the Food Pantry, Refuge, Community Meal, Our Church's Wider Mission, Christmas Fund, One Great Hour of Sharing, Strengthen the Church, Neighbors in Need, Church World Service Blanket Sunday, and Kidz on a Mission. Thank you, church family, for your generous support of these important mission initiatives!
- Live broadcast of our services began on Sunday, January 31. We have five trained operators thus far, and will rotate responsibility for handling the streaming of services from week to week. We appreciate your continued patience, as each person will have an initial learning curve. We also appreciate Brenda's efforts to pre-record music in advance (thus assuring social distancing) and produce the excellent music videos incorporated in weekly services.
- In order to enhance audio quality, we planning to replace the old sound mixer which served the church for many years but is quite outdated. The cost of a new mixer was not part of our original project budget, but has been donated by a church family.
- We look forward the time when we can again worship together in person. Meanwhile, we are <u>enormously</u> <u>grateful</u> for your continued financial support.
