Pastor's Column—March 2022

"Lent, Good Friday, and Other 'Downers' of Religion"

Lately, I've been preparing worship and sermons for our new series, based on Richard Rohr's *"Breathing Under Water: Spirituality and the Twelve Steps"* which, as many of you know, explores our addictions and a spiritual process for releasing those addictions. I don't know who has addictions to what things, events, places, people, sports, activities and so on. What I do know that almost everyone has them. And we don't like it, and we don't like to talk about it.

The other option would have been to choose "Atlas of the Heart: Mapping Meaningful Connection and the Language of Human Experience" a new book by author Brene' Brown, who studies shame and vulnerability. These are topics we don't want to talk about either. Dr. Brown tells several humorous stories about being a shame researcher and the reactions people have to her work. Even at public speaking events, she's been asked to "please talk about something else." We all have some degree of shame, and some fear of vulnerability. And we don't like it, and we don't want to talk about it.

Then I heard a great podcast, again by Dr. Brown, where she interviewed Daniel Pink, author of a brand-new book *"The Power of Regret: How Looking Backward Moves Us Forward."* I've only read the introduction, but already he has me quite interested by talking about the number of ways people proclaim that they have "no regrets." In fact, one of this researcher's goals is to reclaim the word regret. He writes:

Some beliefs operate quietly, like existential background music. Others become anthems for ways of living. And few credos blare more loudly than the doctrine that regret is foolish – that it wastes our time and sabotages our well-being. From every corner of the culture the message booms. Forget the past; seize the future. Bypass the bitter; savor the sweet. A good life has a singular focus (forward) and an unwavering valence (positive). Regret perturbs both. It is backward-

looking and unpleasant – a toxin in the bloodstream of happiness.

If he is right, then regret is something we all have. We don't like it, and we don't want to talk about it.

All of this comes during Lent, which for some, is the worst part of the church year. We love Easter, but not too excited about the six weeks before it. Lent brings with it a service containing ashes (Ash Wednesday), which most people avoid like the plague. If they do come, there is great fear about what these ashes mean and about why we put them on our heads. Some of that is reaction to Catholicism among Protestants, but much more of it is just the idea that someone would put ash on our head and remind us that "we are created from beloved dust, and we shall return to it." It has a tinge of mortality to it.

Good Friday, same thing. That day recognizes betrayal, brutal crucifixion of an innocent person, taunting, and a host of other negative actions. The service often ends in silence. It can be, from some perspectives, rather depressing. For some people, we don't like it, and we don't want to talk about it.

The hardest thing for us to deal with in our life, I believe, are those things that we would just as soon avoid. The reason, often, is because it stirs up pain and sorrow. What we fail to see is that these same things, as we journey through them, lead to reconciliation and a sense of peace we've never experienced. We deal with our hurts one way or another. Every major researcher agrees – either by choice or by chance.

Daniel Pink reminds us that there is "positive power" to "negative emotions". The purpose of Pink's book is "to reclaim regret as an indispensable human emotion – and to show you how to use its many strengths to make better decisions, perform

better at work and school, and bring greater meaning to your life. In other words, we don't dwell in these negative emotions or experiences, but we use them to grow and find meaning.

The same is true of dealing with addictions (ours or others), naming our shame, and yes, going through all the emotions that Lent elicits. Easter Sunday is a wonderful day, but quite meaningless without the other events of Holy Week.

Each Sunday now we are inviting people to take a journey with us. It can be an arduous journey sometimes, but in the end and along the way we find meaning, and hope, and promise, and peace and a Source of our Being that is closer to us that we ever imagined. Instead of being religious, we learn to be faithful. Instead of being afraid of God, we come to be at peace and find our home in God. Instead of our emotions controlling and containing us, we are set free to become all that God intends for us to be – or put another way – to become the best version of ourselves possible.

I invite you to take this journey together.
