Pastor's Column – March 2024 "A New Perspective"

Much of the month of March is in the season of Lent. Lent is meant to be a time of reflection. Many people get caught up in what to give up for Lent, and some improved on that by coming up with things we could take on for Lent. Both of them are admirable activities. For me, though, I think of Lent as a time of inward reflection, set off by an Ash Wednesday service that is relatively quiet and introspective.

Part of the task of reflection involves learning something new. Even though many of the scriptures and activities are familiar to many of us, each year I hope to bring new light and new vantage points from which to see ourselves and our faith in a new way.

This year, with the help of Sanctified Art, we are exploring the life of Peter. Many of us know parts of Peter's life, but we don't know how the stories fit together, and we struggle sometimes with who he was. He certainly was not perfect by any stretch, and like most of us,



he dealt with serious faith questions: doubt, misunderstanding, who is God?, who is this Jesus?, what's my role?, and so forth. I hope that the Sundays in Lent will help you not only see Peter differently, but see yourself in him. I hope the journey of the "wandering heart" will lead you to greater faith, an experience of grace, and ultimately, growth in whatever form that takes.

In the same vein, I'd like to invite you to join me in a journey of Diana Butler Bass' book *Experiencing Jesus Anew: Rediscovering Jesus as Friend, Teacher, Savior, Lord, Way and Presence*. The book, written in 2021, is by a well-known Christian theologian. Maybe many of you have heard of her or experienced her work before? Butler Bass is best known for her writing on religion and contemporary spirituality, especially where faith intersects with politics and culture.

I got my copy from ThriftBooks and it was relatively inexpensive. I suggest those who participate join me on Zoom on Thursday nights at 7pm, beginning March 7, with the exception of March 28 as that is Maundy Thursday. See later in the newsletter for a complete schedule and the zoom link.

May your Lenten experience be eye-opening and faith-deepening.

"Mona Viviano"

If you spend any amount of time at the First Congregational Church UCC of Gaylord, you'll soon notice a strong, quiet woman helping out in a myriad of ways to keep things running smoothly. Mona Viviano has been a part of the congregation for more than 60 years. Throughout the years she has served in most official positions, represented First Congregational at meetings around the state, and has always jumped in wherever needed for church services and events.

Ramona Evans was born an Indiana Hoosier, the first of seven children, to a father who made his living as a painter and a homemaker mother. For many years she lived on a farm that her father inherited, but in her teens moved to Gaylord and graduated from Gaylord High School in 1957.

From an early age Mona knew she wanted to be a hairdresser. She had two uncles who were barbers and was promised that they would help set her up in the business. The move to Michigan disrupted this plan, but Mona did not let her dream die. She attended Hillsdale Beauty College and spent 57 years working in her chosen career in Gaylord salons.

At the age of 42, Mona married Vincent Viviano and joined his family of 3 boys and 2 girls. The Viviano family has since added 32 grandchildren and great grandchildren. Mona and Vince were married for 28 years before he passed away 14 years ago. At the age of 84, Mona remains active by volunteering at the community food pantry, maintaining the church sharing closet, and playing golf.

Mona's early religious instruction began at a Baptist church in Indiana, but in her teen years the Baptist church no longer seemed a good fit. Several of her young classmates in Gaylord talked about their experiences at Gaylord's First Congregational, so she decided to give it a try. She joined the church in the early 1960s and has been a member ever since. Mona is currently involved in Women's Fellowship, takes part in the Reaching In/Reaching Out mission, attends state meetings, and volunteers to help in almost every aspect of church life.

When asked what it was about First Congregational Church that has kept her attending all these years, Mona says her faith plays a large part in it. She has practically grown up in this church and currently enjoys the friendliness and feeling of being part of a church family. In her quiet way, she serves as an inspiration to others, living out her favorite bible passage: *But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you* (Matthew 6:6-7 New International Version)




