### Pastor's Column – November, 2024

### "Our Money Story"

I hope you decided to read this column, despite the fact that the title might make you a little nervous. Money is one of those things we need, but it certainly is one of those things we don't want to talk about. However, it was important enough to Jesus that he talked about our money more than most any other topic in our New Testament. He knew that money had power in our lives and we had better deal with it. In fact, we often think money has negative power (and it does), but more importantly, it has positive power. Money can control us, or we can control our money. But like most things, if we don't talk about it, then it's power becomes even greater. We can be addicted to money just like we can anything else.

So, in November, we're going to talk about money. I hope to still see you in church! We're using materials put together by Sanctified Art. We have loved their material for Advent and Lent, so maybe they'll do a good job talking with us about money? Here's their introduction to the topic:

We all have a money story, whether we recognize it or not. Perhaps we are living from a story of fear or shame. Or a story that the church is dying and no longer relevant. Or a story that our actions won't have an impact. Or a story that we don't have enough. Where might God be speaking a new narrative into the limited ones we have told ourselves? This theme invites us to discover and tell our money stories in light of God's money story of liberation and justice.

This series encourages us to transform our stewardship practices into more full expressions of who we are and what we believe.

This theme is intentionally direct—it invites us to name exactly what we're talking about and not skirt around it. To speak of money is to invite tension into the room. We so quickly want to avoid it. But it's time we reframe this. Money and possessions are one of the most common topics in scripture, and Jesus talked about money more than faith and prayer. Our money story, therefore, is a spiritual story. Thinking about God's money story should be liberating, inviting, and transformative.

This stewardship season, we invite you to remember, release, reimagine, and restore your money stories so that we can write the one God is begging us to live into.

I hope that you will engage this series through the month of November and as you consider your stewardship to the church and to the world between now and Thanksgiving. As always, I look forward to talking with you about anything -- especially hard things -- when the time is right.

### The Refuge In Otsego County and Karing Home Youth Project Partner to Raise Awareness and Support for the Homeless in Otsego County

The Refuge in Otsego County (The Refuge) and the Karing Home Youth Project (KHYP), both non-profit organizations dedicated to serving the homeless in Otsego County, want you to have the opportunity to understand homelessness more personally.

The Refuge and KHYP are offering two micro-events in November designed to raise awareness and engage the community in discussions. These events include a "Sleep Out" on November 8 under the downtown Pavilion from 6 pm - midnight, and a "Town Hall" discussion on *homelessness in our community* at the Otsego Public Library on November 14 from 12:15 - 1:30 pm.

All ages can and are encouraged to participate. The "Sleep Out" provides the opportunity for you to walk in the shoes of a homeless person for a few hours – you are asked to arrive with just the warm clothes and supplies you can carry (no tents or camp chairs please). You will learn "hands on" how the homeless try to best survive in cold weather – receiving a cardboard box and newspaper to create your shelter. You will also have the opportunity to learn more about the everyday experiences of the homeless through stories and videos. Chairs will be available for those unable to stand. Please join with us on November 14 to take advantage of the opportunity to learn more about your community and the actual challenges faced daily in Otsego County. Our "Town Hall" will feature speakers from the Northeast Michigan Community Service Agency (NEMCSA), our local governmental housing agency, joined by organization representatives who will share the facts of homeless here and now in our community. Our approach to Conference Ministry is outward-focused which means meeting our churches where they are to see how we can help in these challenging times. I'm on the road preaching most weekends because there is no better way to connect with congregations and lay leaders than by being with you for worship and fellowship. The other six days of the week, amidst the countless behind-the-scenes interactions, phone calls and prayers we share, Associate Conference Minister Cheryl Burke supports 14 new Caring Clergy Groups with monthly participation of over 100 pastors and members-in-discernment. Associate Conference Minister Lawrence Richardson has consulted with more than 30 churches on visioning, conflict resolution, building use, and searches for new pastors.

Celebrating: It is a joy to recognize the sustaining presence of local churches with anniversaries, baptisms, communion, new members, and retirements. This year, our collective staff has participated in 6 installations, 5 ordinations, and over 90 visits to local churches! Connecting: Knowing that most of our churches are time-strapped we keep challenging ourselves to find the best ways to engage and learn together, be it social media, a simplified website, a monthly Conference Minister message or the newsletter that now includes inspiring stories about Michigan churches.

Empowering: One of our top priorities is to respond to the questions you are asking. In Zoom lunches or at Vitality Day hosted in a local church, our programs range from practical to sublime. From budgets and bylaws to spiritual practices and preaching, to widening Christ's witness in an unjust world, we want you to feel supported and uplifted.

Equipping: We are honored to continue to resource UCC clergy and churches in Michigan. New this year, we have developed a unified online form to make applying for grants in the Michigan Conference easier and more transparent. Grants now include local church revitalization, growth and learning for clergy, new church starts, clergy assistance in a health crisis, disaster relief for local churches, and seminary scholarships.

As a church depends on pledges, we in the Michigan Conference rely on your Basic Support for most of our operating budget. We see the urgent realities to be dealt with but we also see fresh outbreaks of the Spirit in our midst. In our UCC covenant, freely chosen, church members give a percentage of income to their church, the church then shares a percentage of their operating budget as Basic Support with the Conference, and we then share 10% of that with the National setting. As you review your enclosed and personalized eleven-year report, please know how

much we appreciate your gifts. We ask that you review the information, plan to input current details into the data hub in January 2025, and prayerfully consider your annual contribution to Basic Support of our Church's Wider Mission as a congregation.

# THE**REFUGE**

### The Refuge Homeless Shelter Facing Tough Budget Choices

The Refuge, a 501(c) tax-exempt, non-profit organization established with the help of several local congregations, including First Congregational Church, provides temporary housing to the homeless in Otsego County during the winter months. Due to financial concerns this year, it will delay its opening until Monday, October 28<sup>th</sup>. The shelter program would normally open October 1.

The Refuge is in its 12<sup>th</sup> season. Started as an organization using church facilities, the non-profit now provides temporary shelter at local hotels for homeless households in Otsego County during the cold winter months. Last year, 253 individuals, including 77 children, in 128 households received hope and temporary housing for more than 1400 nights. Working with local partners, the program helped 66% of its program participants into more permanent housing. Funding from congregations and individual members was key to being able to achieve this result. An even bigger challenge is expected this year.

### The Refuge November Opportunities at a Glance

The Refuge plans to have a Sleep Out fundraiser (A Night Without A Home) on November 8 in the evening, hopefully on the courthouse lawn (TBD). All ages are welcome to participate.

The congregations are invited to approach their youth groups and general membership about "sleeping out" to help us all learn more about the real effects of homelessness. Participants are asked to collect funds by soliciting sponsors in an amount to cover 1 night of housing, currently \$67.

<u>The Refuge has agreed to hold a "town hall" Homelessness in Otsego County on November</u> <u>14 at the Otsego County Library 12:15 – 1:15 pm</u>. The event will include a speaker from NEMCSA to talk directly about homelessness in Otsego County. A second speaker has been invited to talk about current local community responses to homelessness.

The congregations are invited to attend this event to learn more about our challenges.

The Refuge has agreed to partner with the Otsego County Food Pantry for the Community Meal on November 15<sup>th</sup>.

The congregations are encouraged to attend this free event from 4-6 pm at the First United Congregational Church.

The Food Pantry has agreed to provide tours of their facility. No specific November date has yet been set.

The congregations are encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity to tour the Otsego Food Pantry to learn more about their operations on behalf of those in need.

The Refuge will approach local businesses/congregations to collect donations for The Refuge by displaying The Refuge's church banks (14 available) during this fall campaign.

The congregations are encouraged to set a goal of providing \$3,000 for The Refuge between October 1 and April 20, 2024 (Easter). The church banks are available for display at times appropriate for the congregation's effort. They are encouraged to select the manner in which providing support works best for them and The Refuge will provide whatever support is needed.

### **General Notes:**

The Refuge is committed to providing congregations with whatever written material or speakers are necessary to promote their efforts.

- It is suggested that congregations might consider pursuing adding homelessness to their schedule of existing Bible study classes during this period.
- It is suggested that congregations invite a representative of The Refuge to speaker during worship services or to other congregation related groups as appropriate.

### On Voting, from Michigan Conference UCC

### Power is in our vote. Know MI Voting Rights, **GOTV** and **VOTE to PROTECT DEMOCRACY**

In these times of "alternative" facts competing with facts, "selective" history being taught in our schools, equity and Inclusiveness being examined and questioned, and voting rights being restricted rather than expanded, many of us on the United Church of Christ Detroit Metro Area Social Justice Team are concerned that the very future of our Democracy is at risk.

We believe that as people of faith we must stand-up for our Christian values of equality and equal rights for all people. We must be the voice of those who unfortunately are marginalized and have no voice in our society. We must ensure that all our children receive a good quality education that prepares them to take their place in our society and earn a living which can support them and their families.

The Fall 2024 Election is very important, not just for the Presidential Office, but for all offices which are to be filled. We believe that as Christians, it is our responsibility to work in coalitions with people of similar values in a nonpartisan way to make plans to GET OUT THE VOTE and PRESERVE DE-MOCRACY. And we can individually urge support and vote for those candidates who demonstrate these values, not just by what they say, but by their actions as well.

### But first we need to work to ensure that everyone gets registered to vote:

To register to vote you must be • a United States citizen; • a Michigan resident at the time you register and a resident of your city or township for at least 30 days when you vote; • at least 18 years of age (when you vote); • and not currently serving a sentence in jail or prison (in jail awaiting trial or already served sentence can vote, just have to re-register). You can register up to the day of the election at your local clerk's office.
