Pastor's Submission – October, 2023 "My Money Story"

It is that time of year when the church begins to talk about stewardship. We all know that the church needs financial resources to pay our staff, support our building, and carry out our mission. Nobody really wants to talk about money – or ask for it – but such is the way of the church year. In the fall, most churches talk about money and budget. You will be hearing from me and others in the church about stewardship and the church's money soon. That is **not** what this column is about, however. Instead, taking the lead from Rev. Cameron Trimble's book (that the Council has been studying), *Piloting Church: Helping Your Congregation Take Flight, I want to explore with you your own money story. We each have one and that story impacts much of our life* – *including our giving to charity.*

Trimble opens her chapter talking about how both her parents lost their job in the same day. It led her to this approach to money. "I started my journey to financial independence that day I watched my parents deal with their layoffs. I didn't want to be a burden on anyone, and I wanted to help others as I could. I would never be owned by or indebted to another person. I would never be vulnerable to that kind of crisis. I would work myself to death if necessary to be sure I never lived through that pain again."

Sound familiar? Maybe not exactly, but many of us grew up with what Trimble calls a "fear-based" relationship to money. Going further, she writes, "[We] hoard money, scared that, should [we] need it, [we] better have it saved up. I learned that lesson, but it never served me well. It made me feel small and scared and stingy. I felt like I couldn't breathe.

So, I flipped the message. I decided to live this story with this story about money: Money is energy, an exchange between people that represents trade and investment. Money comes and goes. I will always have enough. I am more resourceful than I know. When forced into a scary space, I can draw on energy, opportunities, and people who open new possibilities. People of good will want me to succeed, just as I want that for them. I just have to keep moving, trusting, and loving."

She continues, "When I flipped my story about money, I realized that both stories could be true. One felt more life-giving, and one more life-taking. One helped me live more fully; one made me hesitate and feel vulnerable. I had the power to choose which one had influence in my life. It became a literal exercise in mind over matter."

She recognizes, as do I, that not everyone has the same economic opportunities as we may have. And yet, "no matter what your situation, you have access to energy, opportunities, and people who can help you gain access to the resources you need."

The Council recently engaged the rest of Trimble's chapter, from a personal place. What is your money story? How does it empower you, and how does it hold you back? "Every one of us has a money story," writes Trimble, "Most of us haven't chosen our story...The good news is that, as adults, we now have control over the role we allow these stories to play in our lives. Better yet, we can rewrite them as needed when they aren't serving us well."

I invite you, this stewardship season, to not only consider what you'll give to the church for our ministry and mission together, but you'll also ponder your own money story and be sure that it is the story that will serve you the best. Further, what is our church's money story? Is it serving us well?

Where Does the Money Go?

When it comes to church giving, I love financial transparency and I assume you do too. If you don't, feel free to skip this monthly missive, but not before reading the next sentence. If I haven't said it to you in person at your church yet, let me say it here in writing:



Thank you for your church's financial support of "Our

Church's Wider Mission," and in particular, for what we call your "Basic Support," which funds our work in the Michigan Conference, as well as the National Setting.

Those Basic Support OCWM dollars function for us in the same way that pledges do in a congregation or any other organization. They fund our ministry to recruit the best pastors (in the midst of a historic clergy shortage), to nurture people with a call to ministry (through scholarships and vocational encouragement amidst the hardest religious landscape I can remember), to care for the pastors we already have (many of whom are preaching at more than one church, or working other demanding jobs), and to support our amazing volunteer lay leaders with practical programs that address the specific questions I hear you asking when I visit your churches.

It is your Basic Support that allows our staff to do all they do; whether it is a scheduled Sunday visit from me as your Conference Minister, or a late night call to an Associate Conference Minister who jumps in her car to provide care and a last minute sermon to a church whose pastor has passed away. This past year, I was honored to revive the Michigan Conference practice of making clergy Emergency Assistance grants for medical expenses and other crises, and also to tend to the creative spirits of our pastors with a three-day Preaching Retreat this past May.

Through your Basic Support, the Michigan Conference has connected and celebrated our shared ministry with a freshly designed website, newsletter stories about your churches, increased social media presence, and practical workshops like our upcoming Church Vitality Day September 30 on Part Time Ministry. In a brand new program I will be hosting Leadership Lunches on Zoom the first Wednesday of every month. Topics will be chosen specifically to meet the needs I hear from all of you. We already have content and special guests scheduled for the next five months! Our first session on October 4 will be about vandalism and church security, which comes straight from Michigan UCC churches who have been targeted for standing up for justice and love. Getting back to financial transparency, like church members who take a percentage of their income to share with their local church, you, in your local churches, take a percentage of your budget to share with the Michigan Conference through your Basic Support of Our Church's Wider Mission. Of that Basic Support, we keep 70% in Michigan and the other 30% goes to the National Setting (and to the world). This past summer when fires devastated Hawaii, or in the aftermath of the earthquake that hit Morocco, your dollars for disaster relief were already there demonstrating Christ's love. Many of our churches are in the "Five for Five" category. These churches give generously not only to Basic Support, but also to the four other special envelope offerings that flow through the National Setting of the UCC. Every gift of the five is a blessing!

As you consider your local church budget, or even your own **<u>personal giving</u>**, I hope my description here helps you understand exactly where the money goes when you give to Basic Support, AND how much your gifts matter here in Michigan and around the world!

If our Conference ministry has touched you in any way, if there is anything we can do better, or if you have more questions about where your UCC gifts are going, just let me know. As I begin my second year as your Conference Minister, I feel blessed to *equip, empower, encourage and connect* our churches as together we serve God and neighbor. Thank you for your Basic Support in the past, and for prayerfully considering what you will share in the future.

Meet Our Moderator Margaret "Maggie" Wallin By, Maureen Derenzy

The Moderator of our church sets the agendas and presides at meetings of the Church Council and all Congregational Meetings. Maggie Wallin has been serving in this role since 2021. She brings a wealth of experience and ability, having earned a degree in Divinity from the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit, completing an internship at the First Congregational Church in Laingsburg, MI and serving for over 6 years as pastor of First Congregational Church in Breckenridge, MI.

Maggie's career life has followed a varied and expanding path, which to the best of her ability has followed her sense of call on her life and talents. In her words, "it took a long time to figure out what I wanted and needed to be when I grew up." She was born in Lansing and grew up attending the Methodist Church right across from the Capitol Building, where "the village that raised her was her church." She was active in Sunday School, choir, and bell choir. She also played the violin and became concert mistress for the Lansing Junior Symphony. Maggie was raised in a home with a father who worked as an attorney and a stay-at-home mom, and her family supported her college education. She shared that she felt a "profound sense of privilege," which may explain why her career path includes a series of public service jobs that has allowed her to give back to others.

Teaching jobs were scarce in the 1970s when Maggie graduated from the University of Michigan with a teaching certificate in Elementary Education. Instead, she went to work for Florence Crittenden Services in Jackson, working with troubled teens who had been abused, neglected, or had committed an offense. Some were also pregnant. It was a position that gave her a great deal of satisfaction, but she left when an opportunity to teach in inner city Detroit allowed her to use her degree while supplying more financial security. It was not long, though, before she found herself back at the "girl's home", this time as their Education Coordinator, serving as a liaison between the school and home for girls with special needs. Recognizing that she needed a new and different method of serving, she decided on a second career in law and earned a Juris Doctor degree from Cooley Law School. She clerked for the chief judge of Ingham County Circuit Court for two years and clerked two more years for the Michigan Court of Appeals. She then spent 20+ years writing opinions and giving legal advice to the Michigan Public Service Commission, gaining more experience in helping others. She began deepening her investment in her spiritual path while serving in various positions in her original church in Lansing. First, she completed Stephen Minister training for lay ministry and became a Stephen Leader. Then, while still practicing law, Maggie attended seminary one day a week. It took a decade to complete her MDiv, but she managed to graduate in 2010 with no debt!

In 2002, Maggie bought a place on the river in Frederic as a retirement home. When that day came, she began searching for her "up north" church home. With a big smile, Maggie spoke about her new church in glowing terms, referring to the people that are so nice, a welcoming and friendly environment, and a place that lives out its mission. At this point in her life, this accomplished woman just wants to fulfill her desire to bring love and joy to others. Our church is lucky that she has chosen to do it here.

Health Department Services

Your local health department provides many supportive services for you and your family. For information about the services, or for an appointment, please call 1-800-432-4121. Visit our website at www.nwhealth.org.

Blood Lead Screening For Children

Lead poisoning is the number one environmental health threat to children in the U.S. Blood lead screenings are provided in WIC at 12 and 24 months of age, and at monthly clinics in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Otsego counties. Medicaid is accepted. Screening is available to Non-Medicaid clients for a \$25 fee.

Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Navigation Program (BC3NP)

BC3NP provides free breast and cervical cancer screenings including breast and pelvic exam, pap, mammogram and follow-up testing for women age 40 -64. If cancer is found, the Medicaid Treatment Act can help cover costs.

Child and Adolescent Health Centers

Clinics are available for youth in Mancelona (ages 5-21) and in Gaylord (ages 10-21) and their children. Nurse practitioners provide primary health care services – physical exams, treatment for illness and injuries, immunizations, and much more. Behavioral Health Therapists provide individual, family, and group counseling, and work with the Nurse Practitioner and the family. Charges are based on the youth's income, which means there may be no charge or a nominal fee.

Community Connections

A free program offering connections to community resources for adults, children, and families. Individuals will get help with access to medical care, transportation, food, utilities, education, job-seeking services and more! Services are provided by phone calls, office visits or home visits. They are delivered by a Community Health Worker, Registered Nurse and/or a Social Worker in Antrim, Emmet, Charlevoix and Otsego counties. Clients may be referred by their physician or via self-referral by calling 1-800-432-4121.

Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS)

CSHCS is a program within the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. This program is for children and some adults with special health care needs and their families. CSHCS helps persons with chronic health problems by providing coverage and referral for specialty services based on their needs. CSHCS local staff provides family centered services and coordinated community services to assist families in caring for children at home.

Dental Health

Children and adults with Medicaid, Healthy Michigan Plan, Healthy Kids Dental (Delta Dental), and MIChild (Blue Cross or Delta Dental) may receive full dental services through the Health Department's dental clinics in Alpena, Cheboygan, East Jordan, Gaylord, Mancelona, Petoskey, Traverse City, and West Branch. The Northern Dental Plan offers dental services at a reduced fee.
