Pastor's Column – September, 2024 Intentional Community

We never know how our small activities will affect others through the invisible fabric of our connectedness.... In this exquisitely connected world, it's never a question of "critical mass." It's always about *critical connections*.

Buddhist Quaker Valerie Brown encourages an intentional and loving approach to community:

As a teacher at Pendle Hill outside Philadelphia, I continue to grow in my understanding of community. A safe, brave space, Pendle Hill is where, on my better days I bring my most compassionate self forward. This compassion spirals outward as an invitation—an invitation that inclines others to do the same. In this community, I learn about connection and about sharing my vulnerability in ways that grow me, that grow others....

It's easy to have idyllic beliefs about community—that it is a place

where everyone is friendly, agreeable, and polite; a place where there is no conflict, connection is easy, there are no difficult people. What I've discovered, however, is that more often than not, community is about conflict and about how we together navigate it. Conflict often reveals something important, allowing me to yield to something bigger and more important than protecting my ideas around right or wrong. Community calls me toward recognizing the shadow side of myself: the ways in which I am hard, distant, rigid, and unforgiving. Community shows me when I am placing my needs before others, showing up distracted or late, and taking others for granted. The opportunity I am then given is to ask essential questions: Can I be transparent and undefended without collapsing when this feedback comes my way? Can I notice, name, and investigate with open curiosity what I am feeling? Can I offer myself and others kind attention without judgment or blame? The gift of community is the mirror that reflects back to me, that offers me a chance to live into a better part of myself.

New Worship Series Begins in September

Our next sermon series will be "Radical Resilience". The theme originates from the *Daily Meditations* from the Center for Action and Contemplation (cac.org) as it is their theme for 2024. They are going deeper and further with the theme as they have a whole year, but we, too, will explore what Radical Resilience means to each of us.

In the words of Dean of Faculty at the Center for Action and Contemplation, Brian D. McLaren:

The word "radical" means going to the root, going to the depths, going beneath the surface... In fact, that is what contemplation really is: it's paying deep attention to the deep dimensions of life. So, radical resilience means radical, deep attention to the deepest roots of resilience. Resilience is the capacity to withstand and recover from hardship or difficulty. It has to do with the ability to spring back into shape after you've been beaten down or knocked over or bent over.

Here are the scriptures and themes into October related to our theme:

- ⇒ September 8 Radical Resilience: "The Dance of Hope" Isaiah 40: 26-31 and Romans 15: 1-13
- ⇒ September 15 Radical Resilience: "Strength in Weakness" 1 Corinthians 1: 26-28 and 2 Corinthians 12: 8-10
- ⇒ September 22 Radical Resilience: "As a Village" Romans 12: 1-21 and Galatians 6: 1-10
- ⇒ September 29 Radical Resilience: "Growing Through Adversity" Isaiah 38: 9-20 and Matthew 26: 36-46
- ⇒ October 6 Radical Resilience: "To Live is to Change" Psalm 103: 1-14 and Matthew 4: 12-17
- ⇒ October 20 Radical Resilience: "Spirituality is the Key" Matthew 6: 5-8 and Matthew 14: 13-21



On Voting, from Michigan Conference UCC

Power is in our vote. Know MI Voting Rights, GOTV and VOTE to PROTECT DEMOCRACY

In these times of "alternative" facts competing with facts, "selective" history being taught in our schools, equity and Inclusiveness being examined and questioned, and voting rights being restricted rather than expanded, many of us on the United Church of Christ Detroit Metro Area Social Justice Team are concerned that the very future of our Democracy is at risk.

We believe that as people of faith we must stand-up for our Christian values of equality and equal rights for all people. We must be the voice of those who unfortunately are marginalized and have no voice in our society. We must ensure that all our children receive a good quality education that prepares them to take their place in our society and earn a living which can support them and their families.

The Fall 2024 Election is very important, not just for the Presidential Office, but for all offices which are to be filled. We believe that as Christians, it is our responsibility to work in coalitions with people of similar values in a non-partisan way to make plans to GET OUT THE VOTE and PRESERVE DE-MOCRACY. And we can individually urge support and vote for those candidates who demonstrate these values, not just by what they say, but by their actions as well.

But first we need to work to ensure that everyone gets registered to vote:

To register to vote you must be • a United States citizen; • a Michigan resident at the time you register and a resident of your city or township for at least 30 days when you vote; • at least 18 years of age (when you vote); • and not currently serving a sentence in jail or prison (in jail awaiting trial or already served sentence can vote, just have to re-register). You can register up to the day of the election at your local clerk's office.
